Recently we received funding from the Government under the Great Results Guarantee program. A great deal of the judgement about our success is made by the government via our NAPLAN results, so we are concentrating on improving this outcome for all year 3,5,7 and 9 students.

The NAPLAN (National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy) tests are on in Week 4 of next term. As per usual we will make a special effort to encourage all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 to attend for the tests and we will provide them with some brain food during the tests. Our celebrations for finishing the tests will be the (now a bit of a tradition) hot dogs cooked to perfection and topped with bacon onion and cheese!!!

Jun. Sec. Student Council



9/10 Science Review

This term in Science we have been learning about Sound Energy. Students have learnt that sounds are created by vibrations that then travel in waves to our ears. Students have participated in many experiments including making music playing water glasses, testing insulation theories and making rice dance on a speaker. The waves are travelling about the same speed, this is the number of waves needed in a hundredth of a second to reach the ear Short wavelength means more waves High frequency, high sound Long wavelength means less waves low frequency and low sound

9/10 Geography

Junior Secondary Sports Club

Geography this term has been based on the topic of Biomes and largely has involved looking into why different vegetation types are found where they are around the globe. This has been linked closely to climatic conditions so an understanding of factors that control weather has been a key part of the work covered.

Traditional indigenous land care practices such as fire-stick farming have been compared to European agricultural techniques that are largely based on land clearing and agriculture. The environmental impacts of agriculture such as pollution, soil erosion and dry land salinity have been investigated. We have also studied other techniques used by different cultures such as "Slash and Burn" shifting cultivation.

Senior Phase Classroom Update

Marine and Aquatic Practices

The focus of this term has been learning about coral reef ecosystems. The topic is of great relevance for people living within the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park. Students have learnt about coral polyps and their needs for survival. They have investigated how colonies of corals have created various reef types and how some reefs are responsible for creating coral islands (cays). The studies have included looking at coral reef ecosystems and how food and energy is moved between the various plants and animals. A major component of the unit and the basis for assessment of this unit has been a field study which was conducted at Pencil Bay.

Fortunately the wind dropped out, the sun came out, the water cleared and we were blessed with a near perfect day. Pencil bay was stunning. I was very impressed with the way the students conducted themselves and participated in the day to collect the relevant data. Students were using kayaks to take depth and temperature measurements and snorkeling to investigate what was living on the sea bed. A special thanks to Koipe and Kenny who assisted me in setting up the study site. Their efforts were outstanding and without their help the study would not have been the success it was.

Certificate II Active Volunteering

The Certificate II in Active
Volunteering course involves the
completion of eight modules over the
period of the course. Students have
studied the important roles volunteers
play in caring for the community and
the diversity of learning opportunities
that exist for volunteers. The focus for
this term has been the Workplace
Health and Safety module which is
required before students can become
involved in volunteering activities.

Students have learnt about hazards in the workplace and procedures they should follow in the event of finding an unsafe situation. They have studied the rights and responsibilities of employers and employees and are aware of how to deal with incidents that may arise. Some time has been spent looking at the vital role that the SES and volunteers involved in disaster management fulfill.

Pre-Vocational Maths

The PVM students have been learning all about construction maths. This has seen them learn formulas for Area and Perimeter and practice calculating various perimeters and areas around the school and classroom. This real world practical application of Math has seen them calculate the quantity of fencing used around the school as well as work out how much it would cost to recarpet the classrooms and paint buildings.

English Communication

The work unit for this term was titled, 'Tools of the Trade'. The students had to access various websites, to search for different occupations, read and deconstruct employment and training brochures, as well as, identify target employment goals for themselves. Their assessment task was based on creating their own brochure, outlining a specific occupation, with all details showing instructions, for persons wanting to gain employment in that field. The students have developed a better idea of which pathways to follow, for their own future employment options.

Recreation

The class has learnt about different training methods and training principles. The students have developed an understanding of continuous training, resistance training, interval training, flexibility training and circuit training. The students have set-up and performed circuit training sessions in the school hall. The students were assessed on their ability to participate practical sessions and their creation, of a personal fitness plan. The students proved they were very capable of full participation and videos of training sessions were presented to the Secondary School Parades.
